


#### **Remembering our Crest Friends**

Riz has graciously consented to travel down from the LA area to be with us.

Excerpt from "The Coachella Valley Weekly": I have often heard of artists referred to as a 'savant'; a connoisseur or master, if you will, of their chosen field or art. I had never actually met one before. Riz Orkestra changed that. Eyes closed, the look of pure joy streaming from his face and feet keeping time to his original music masterfully played on his personally customized electric slide guitars, Riz transported himself and took the audience with him to a century old Mississippi front porch. He works the blues like a preacher works a prayer with songs like 'No More Credit at the Liquor Store' and 'Shoo Fly, Don't Bother Me.' Impressed as I was, I had only tapped into the surface of all that is Riz Orkestra. Humble and unpretentious as they come, it



wasn't until I sat down and interviewed this soulful individual, that I realized I was in the presence of a master.

Jim is a guitar master who seems to be able to pass that guitar joy right on to his audiences. His version of 'Walking on the Moon' is a wonder to the ears. Excerpt from "The San Diego Reader"

Jim Earp has been playing guitar since 1973. He describes his playing style as "noveau-celtic-classical-folk." His guitar of choice is a custom Rosewood 6-String Cutaway and a Steinberger GM. In 2009, Earp went to the annual Walnut Valley Music Festival in Winfield, Kansas, and came home with honors. "When I made the finals this year, the second-place winner from last year greeted me and introduced himself and gave me his business card and was all smiles and very friendly."

What song did Earp play that caught the judges' ears at Winfield? "I performed a hymn, an arrangement of 'Jesus Loves Me' from my third collection of hymns. I turned it into a Celtic dance piece. I've made the finals twice with that song."

The mission of the sub-regional planning group is to advise and assist the Director of Planning, the Planning and Environmental Review Board, the

Zoning Administrator, the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors in the preparation, amendment and implementation of community and sub-regional plans.

Crest Planning Representatives are: Judy Bowen, Pat Ulm, Ralph Slagill, and Karla Caroll

Meetings are held the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of each month at 7:00 pm. Locations rotate between the Dehesa School, The Crest Community Center, and the Harbison Canyon Community Center.

The following are excerpts from the January 11 minutes pertaining to Crest:

#### G2a. Subcommittee reports. Community parks priority list.

Pat Ulm suggested that the County might fund some ADA-accessible improvements at South Lane Park, without the issue of a maintenance entity being a problem; and that members of the Crest Garden Club had asked her about the possibility of having a raised gazebo/bandstand with electric service constructed in the northeast corner of Nancy Jane Park, which could be a possible PLDO project.

Wally Riggs informed the Group that in a December email, Supervisor Jacobs expressed interest in considering options for updating the PLDO, which was originally written in 1973 and last updated in 2006. He noted the long standing issue about maintenance responsibility at South Lane Park, and said he would send an email to Supervisor Jacobs' assistant, Adam Wilson, explaining the need for resolving this problem with the current PLDO funding requirements for parks in our Subregion.

Pat Ulm said she would contact Kandy Franklin about the present status of the Crest Equestrian Group, and about the previous legal arrangements the equestrian group may have had with the County regarding South Lane Park.

Chairman Riggs authorized Mary Manning to draft a letter to the County to request non-PLDO funding to correct long term maintenance problems at Olde Ironside Park Community Building that result from lack of gutters, which causes rain water to flood the building wall and rot its base.

Judy Bowen will prepare a draft 2016 PLDO Park Projects Priority List for consideration at the February meeting.







#### Crest Resident, Pat Goulart Receives Senate Certificate of Recognition


History program. And for good reason, too—from 1931 to 1950. Goulart lived inside a lighthouse!

Goulart was provided with a Senate Certificate of Recognition by State Senator Joel Anderson. "Pat is an amazing example of someone who goes above and beyond to share the rich history of her community," said Anderson. "I am delighted to honor her and to learn about her exciting volunteer engagement."

In anticipation of the Cabrillo National Monument's upcoming 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the change in lighthouse operations, Goulart was excited to share stories of her time in the Old Point Loma Lighthouse, where she and her sister Joan spent most of their youth. Goulart admitted, "When I talk to people, [they] just light up when they hear I grew up in a lighthouse."

Working in a lighthouse required commitment and perseverance. During World War II, the entire property was fenced in and adapted into a formal military complex. Goulart recalled how the troops stationed at Point Loma would keep eight-hour shifts, with at least one person awake and on-duty at all times. Such dedication, she suggested, was what kept the massive structure running.

In 1952, Goulart's father retired from lightkeeper duty, and their family settled in a traditional house. Years later, her other siblings moved far out into the world. When asked what drew her to remain in Crest and the San Diego community, Pat simply said, "Every time I approach that lighthouse, it's like I'm home. I never left it."

Crest residents have inquired as to services available to the Crest senior community. This question was put to residents, friends, and to the NextDoor Crest website, which led me to web searches and telephone calls galore. A special thanks to those who took the time to help provide this valuable information. While there is a tremendous support network for seniors, I have to admit I found it a bit overwhelming and found myself frequently being referred in circles while trying to gather this information. I also found Crest to be a bit of a challenging location – not quite the city, yet did not qualify for rural services. With that said, I hope you find this information helpful. With that said, use this as a first step and, check it out yourself. Many of these resources are open to all seniors. Some programs are dependent on finances, disabilities, and/or need. Others depend on volunteers in our area to perform tasks. You may find many of these agencies offer similar information. I tried to eliminate services outside our area.

The IHSS Program will help pay for services provided to you so that you can remain safely in your own home. To be eligible, you must be over 65 years of age, or disabled, or blind. Disabled children are also potentially eligible for IHSS. IHSS is considered an alternative to out-of-home care, such as nursing homes or board and care facilities. The types of services which can be authorized through IHSS are housecleaning, meal preparation, laundry, grocery shopping, personal care services (such as bowel and bladder care, bathing, grooming and paramedical services), accompaniment to medical appointments, and protective supervision for the mentally impaired.

#### ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ALL IHSS APPLICANTS AND RECIPIENTS:

- 1)You must physically reside in the United States. 2) You must also be a California resident. 3) You must have a Medi-Cal eligibility determination. 4) You must live at home or an abode of your own choosing (acute care hospital, long-term care facilities, and licensed community care facilities are not considered "own home"). 5) You must submit a completed Health Care Certification form.
- HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS
- -A county social worker will interview you at your home to determine your eligibility and need for IHSS. Based on your ability to safely perform certain tasks for yourself, the social worker will assess the types of services you need and the number of hours the county will authorize for each of these services. This assessment will include information given by you and, if appropriate, by your family, friends, physician or other licensed health care professional.
- -A completed Health Care Certification (SOC 873) must be received by the county prior to authorization of services
- -You will be notified if IHSS has been approved or denied. If denied, you will be notified of the reason for the denial. If approved, you will be notified of the services and the number of hours per month which have been authorized for you.
- -If you are approved for IHSS, you must hire someone (your individual provider) to perform the authorized services. You are considered your provider's employer and, therefore, it is your responsibility to hire, train, supervise, and fire this individual.
- -If your county has contracted IHSS providers, you may choose to have services provided by the contractor.
- -If your county has homemaker employees, you may receive services from a county homemaker.

#### HOW ARE IHSS PAYMENTS MADE?

You may contact the social worker assigned to your case to determine the IHSS hourly rate in your county. Because unions negotiate with the employer of record in each county, the wage rates may vary from county to county. The State issues all checks for individual provider payments. If the provider qualifies, the State withholds the applicable amounts for disability insurance and Social Security taxes.

<u>Vial of Life Program</u> - (a program designed to help you store critical medical information in the event of an emergency) Packets are being mailed to Crest for distribution at seniors request.

The Vial of Life Program is designed to speak for you when you can't speak for yourself. The vial contains important medical information that can assist emergency personnel in administering the proper medical treatment." The first thing first responders want to know is your list of medications. When you can't speak for yourself, when you are confused, in pain or scared, the Vial of Life can speak for you.

There are 4 simple steps to getting your Vial of Life kit ready. You can also save and store your Vial of Life information at VialofLife.com for easy access for changing medical and doctor information in the future.

1. Fill out the Vial of Life form -Make blank copies of this form to keep your information current or maintain and store your updated information online with us. Fill out the backside of the Vial of Life form. Answer all or any pertinent questions.2. Place the decal on front of a plastic baggie Place the form you filled out in the plastic baggie. You may also consider placing the following items in the baggie – a copy of EKG, living will or equivalent, DNR (Do Not Resuscitate), and a recent picture of yourself. 3. Place the baggie on refrigerator door. Securely tape plastic baggie on the front of your refrigerator door. Place the decal on your refrigerator – this could be on the front or side of the refrigerator, whichever is easiest for EMS personnel to see and access. 4. Place the second decal on front door - Place the decal on the front door so it can easily be seen by anyone responding to an emergency. Thanks to the Vial of Life, first responders will have all the medical information they need to best treat you. GET YOUR VIAL OF LIFE AT THE CREST LIBRARY.

You may rent or own, and if you qualify, SDG&E's authorized contractors will come to your home and may provide free: 1) New, energy-efficient lighting 2) Repair or replacement of doors and windows 3) Microwaves, water heaters\*, refrigerators and high-efficiency clothes washers\*\* 4)Insulation, weatherstripping and caulking to lower heating and cooling costs. \*\*Existing appliances must meet age requirements to qualify for replacement. Co-pay may be required for landlords who own appliances and pay

tenant utility bill. Eligibility for the no cost energy efficient home improvement program and the energy bill discount program are based on income and household size or by your household participation in certain public assistance programs including Medicaid/Medi-Cal, Medicaid/Medi-Cal for Families A & B, CalFresh (Food Stamps) SNAP, Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Income levels that qualify (example 1-2 household size - \$31,860) You may qualify based on household size and total current household income\*=Total income of all persons living in your house, condo, apartment or mobile home. #### **SDG&E Medical Need discount**:

It is important to know that household income is not a factor for qualifying, but a doctor's certification on the application is required. You can qualify for Medical Baseline Program if you have the following medical conditions and use one or more of the Qualifying Medical Devices listed below.

CTAP provides free phones/devices for folks with hearing, seeing, moving, speaking, learning or remembering difficulties. CTAP is a program of the California Public Utilities Commission.- It is funded by a small surcharge that appears on all telephone bills in California. Requirement are: You must live in California, have telephone service, and your doctor, licensed Optometrist, Audiologist, Speech Therapist, Hearing Aid Dispenser or other qualifying certifying agent must sign the application. They can help you find a certifying agent if you don't have one. There are no income requirements. Obtain the application at www. Legacy Corps members provide free respite services in San Diego County to family members providing care for Veterans of any age. If you are a family caregiver, you may request scheduled respite visits from a Legacy Corps member. We will schedule an assessment prior to assigning a volunteer. The program is designed to help relieve stress and burden for caregivers in military families.

Legacy Corps members are volunteers who commit to serving 450 hours in a one-year period (approximately 10 – 12 hours per week) and are selected after meeting eligibility criteria. Members meeting their service goals receive skills training, a \$200 per month living allowance, and an educational award of \$1,468. It is not required to be a Veteran to serve as a member.

#### Aid & Attendance (A&A)

The Aid & Attendance (A&A) increased monthly pension amount may be added to your monthly pension amount if you meet one of the following conditions: Wartime veterans and their surviving spouses, 65 years and older, may be entitled to a tax-free benefit called Aid and Attendance provided by the Department of Veteran Affairs. The Benefit is designed to provide financial aid to help offset the cost of long-term care for those who need assistance with the daily activities of living such as bathing, dressing, eating, toileting, and transferring.

- You require the aid of another person in order to perform personal functions required in everyday living, such as bathing, feeding, dressing, attending to the wants of nature, adjusting prosthetic devices, or protecting yourself from the hazards of your daily environment
- You are bedridden, in that your disability or disabilities requires that you remain in bed apart from any
  prescribed course of convalescence or treatment
- You are a patient in a nursing home due to mental or physical incapacity
- Your eyesight is limited to a corrected 5/200 visual acuity or less in both eyes; or concentric contraction
  of the visual field to 5 degrees or less
- Housebound This increased monthly pension amount may be added to your monthly pension amount when you are substantially confined to your immediate premises because of permanent disability.

**Qualification Requirements** 

- Must have served at least 90 days of active duty with at least one day during a period of war.
- Must have anything other than a Dishonorable discharge.
- A surviving spouse must have been married to the veteran at the time of his passing.
- Must require the assistance of another person to perform some of the daily activities of living.
- Must meet income and countable asset criteria established by the VA.
- Must be 65 years and older or totally disabled.

Eligible Periods of War:

- World War II: December 7, 1941 December 31, 1946, inclusive. If the veteran was in service on December 31, 1946, continuous service before July 26, 1947, is considered World War II service.
- Korean conflict: June 27, 1950 January 31, 1955, inclusive.
- Vietnam era: The period beginning on February 28, 1961, and ending on May 7, 1975, inclusive, in the case of a veteran who served in the Republic of Vietnam during that period. The period beginning on August 5, 1964, and ending on May 7, 1975, inclusive, in all other cases.
- Persian Gulf War: August 2, 1990, through date to be prescribed by Presidential proclamation or law.

#### How to Apply

You may apply for Aid and Attendance or Housebound benefits by writing to the Pension Management Center (PMC) that serves your state. You may also visit your local regional benefit office to file your request. You can locate your local regional benefit office using the VA Facility Locator. You should include copies of any evidence, preferably a report from an attending physician validating the need for Aid and Attendance or Housebound type care. The report should be in sufficient detail to determine whether there is disease or injury producing physical or mental impairment, loss of coordination, or conditions affecting the ability to dress and undress, to feed oneself, to attend to sanitary needs, and to keep oneself ordinarily clean and presentable. Whether the claim is for Aid and Attendance or Housebound, the report should indicate how well the applicant gets around, where the applicant goes, and what he or she is able to do during a typical day. In addition, it is necessary to determine whether the claimant is confined to the home or immediate premises. Also the American Veterans Aid, a private company, is dedicated to helping war era veterans and their surviving spouses receive this Benefit which they so deserve

#### Aid & Attendance and Housebound

Veterans and survivors who are eligible for a VA pension and require the aid and attendance of another person, or are housebound, may be eligible for additional monetary payment. These benefits are paid in addition to monthly pension, and they are not paid without eligibility to Pension.

Since Aid and Attendance and Housebound allowances increase the pension amount, people who are not eligible for a basic pension due to excessive income may be eligible for pension at these increased rates. A Veteran or surviving spouse may not receive Aid and Attendance benefits and Housebound benefits at the same time.


